Scotch Plains Recreation Has a Glorious Past and Looks Toward the Future

Enthusiastic, caring citizens have been responsible for the success of the Scotch Plains Recreational programs. From the organization of the Board of Recreation Commissioners in 1946 until the present day, these concerned citizens have successfully turned over responsibility to their sons, daughters and grandchildren.

The Board has consisted of seven members who serve from one to five years without compensation. The Board has recreation programs, operation of Scotch Hills Golf Course and long-range planning for future recreational sites. Presently Town Manager Tom Atkins places the members of the board.

Tom Atkins has done a very good job in placing people on the commission so that he is sensitive to the feelings of everybody in the community," said Recreation Chairman Ed Zazzali.

Farley Avenue Recreation Park became Scotch Plains' first recreational park in 1947. Located on East Second Street, Front Street and Farley Avenue the five-acre park consists of two baseball diamonds, swings, a basketball court and several additional facilities.

Brookside Park Wildlife Preserve was dedicated in 1976 and is located on Hetfield Avenue. Brookside features a softball field, picnic facilities and facilities

for children. Located off Plainfield Road near Scotch Hills Golf Course, construction began on Jerseyland Field in 1979. Aside from a softball field, some playground facilities exist.

Three men's softball leagues, The Scotch Plains slo-pitch, the St. Bart's Oldtimers slo-pitch and the Jewish Community Center play the majority of their games at either Brookside, Jerseyland or Farley. Each league has been in existence for more than twenty years.

Proud of the long success of these leagues, Zazzali pointed out that, "These leagues and responsibilities have been handed down over the years to people who are residents. These people take pride in their work."

Zazzali stressed, "It's not just organizing the programs, it's making sure that everything is taken care of."

Prior to Dennis Pedicini was the chairman. Like Zazzali, Pedicini exhibited pride in his work. "Dennis was part of the recreation commission for 15 years as well as a softball player. Dennis still cares."

Zazzali added, "He owned a children's garment store in the center of town. He was part of the community. He is still involved in recreation. He was the one who got me involved in recreation."

Booth Field which hosts the Scotch Plains Youth Baseball League was developed in 1954 and is owned by the New Jersey Department of Transportation. Greenside Playground and Green Forest Park located off Westfield Road and Evergreen followed suit in 1962. Green Forest features tennis courts and both provide facilities for children and civic groups.

In 1964, the town acquired nine holes of the Shady Rest Country Club which is presently known as the Scotch Hills Golf Course. The clubhouse was originally an old farm house owned by Ephraim Tucker.

Zazzali wanted to be sure that people knew that recreation in Scotch Plains is really for everybody. "We have Dianne Ledder who is serving her fourth five-year term. So you not only have younger people who have younger kids but you also have older people on the commission who keep the seniors in mind. It's that kind of relationship which give you longevity."

Recently, plans have been drawn for the construction of Ash Brook

Park possibly to be located at the section of the Ash Brook Reservation near Martine Avenue and Old Raritan Road. The park could feature two soccer fields, two softball/baseball fields, proposed lighting for the fields, a .75-mile walking path, a concession stand and parking for 110 cars.

The Recreation Commission feels that approval would be good pay back from the county for a tract of land the township gave Union County several decades ago. The Martine Avenue extension was being completed and the town of Scotch Plains sold, for one dollar, 54 acres to the county so that they could complete the deeds.

The deeds were drawn up in 1958 and the project was completed in the mid sixties.

"We were number four on the master plan for the county that they were going to develop a park for us," said Zazzali. "Since then, the county structure had changed and that is why the project never came into being yet."

Presently, there are high hopes of getting an approval for Ash Brook Park.
